## Campaign touts need to shop within Keller

A renewed effort to support businesses in the City will encourage residents to "Keep it in Keller" when it comes to spending their money. ## **Fireplace Safety**

With colder weather outside, some residents may want to take advantage of the cozy warmth of their fireplac-

es. The following are safety tips provided by Keller Fire-Rescue:

#### Keep it clean

- Have your chimney or wood stove inspected and cleaned annually by a certified chimney specialist.
- Clear the area around the hearth of debris, decorations and flammable materials.
- Always use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces. Leave glass

doors open while burning a fire.

- Install stovepipe thermometers to help monitor flue temperatures.
- Keep air inlets on wood stoves open, and never restrict air supply
  - to fireplaces. Otherwise you may cause creosote build-up that could lead to a chimney fire.
  - Use fire-resistant materials on walls around wood stoves.

#### Burn safe fuels

• Never use flammable liquids to start a fire.

Use only seasoned hardwood.
 Soft, moist wood accelerates creo-

sote buildup.

- Build small fires that burn completely and produce less smoke.
- Never burn cardboard boxes, trash or debris in your fireplace or wood stove.
- When building a fire, place logs at the rear of the fireplace on an adequate supporting grate.
- Never leave a fire in the fireplace unattended. Extinguish the fire before going to bed or leaving the house.
- Soak hot ashes in water and place them in a metal container outside your home.

#### Protect the outside

Stack firewood outdoors at

least 30 feet away from your home.

- Keep the roof clear of leaves, pine needles and other debris.
- Cover the chimney with a mesh screen spark arrester.
- Remove branches hanging above the chimney, flues or vents.

#### Protect the inside

- Install smoke detectors on every level of your home. Test them monthly and change the batteries at least once a year. Consider installing the new long-life smoke detectors.
- Provide proper venting systems for all heating equipment.
- Extend all vent pipes at least three feet above the roof.

## Winterize Your Landscape

With the cooler months at hand, it doesn't mean yards, trees and land-scaping don't need a little TLC. The following winterizing tips were supplied by DanBurger, Keller Parks Superintendent:

#### **Tree Care**

- · Remove mistletoe and dead branches.
- Perform structural pruning to include resetting the crowns, providing appropriate clearance and removing branches that rub or interfere with each other.
- Fertilize existing trees and evergreens.
- Make dormant oil applications to your trees, which reduces the number of harmful insects.

#### **Lawn Care**

 Mow leaves with a mulching mower and leave them on your lawn or vacuum leaves and use them as mulch.

Water before a hard freeze.

### **Planting**

- Now is the time to plant trees, shrubs and bulbs for spring color.
- Pull soil samples and send to Texas A&M University for testing (soiltesting. tamu.edu).
- Visit the Fort Worth Botanical Gardens (www.fwbg.org) and the Dallas Arboretum (www.dallasarboretum.org) for winter landscape ideas.

#### **Other Tips**

- Check and clean out your rain gutters.
- Take leisurely walks on the Keller trails to enjoy the new season.

A grand opening event to celebrate the renovation and expansion of the Keller Public Library facility is set for 10 a.m. Saturday, March 6. Keller voters approved a \$4 million library bond to fund the library project in November 2007. Originally 12,500 square feet, the expanded facility will feature state-of-the-art technology and emphasize space for children and public meetings.

## **Public Works Update**

## North Tarrant, Rufe Snow projects are progressing

Two road-widening projects that will increase the capacity for two of Keller's main thorough-fares are moving forward.

#### **North Tarrant Parkway**

Bids were received in mid-December on the project, which will widen the roadway from Whitley Road to Davis Boulevard. The bid is expected to be awarded in January 2010, with construction starting in February or March 2010. Some electric, gas and communication utility lines will be relocated within the next couple of months ahead of the contractor starting construction.

Public Works staff is in the process of acquiring five parcels of additional street right-of-way at the intersections of Whitley Road and Willis Lane. This will allow for left-turn lanes at these intersections. Public Works staff is also

going to extend a 12-inch water main from Cat Mountain Trail to a point just west of Sarah Brooks Drive before road construction begins as part of the City's water system master plan.

#### **Rufe Snow Drive**

City staff and consultants are still in the process of acquiring the remaining two street right-of-way parcels needed for this project, which will widen the roadway from Bear Creek Parkway to Rapp Road. Design of the construction plans is nearly complete. City staff is in the process of applying for a state grant to help fund the proposed 10-foot wide concrete hike/bike trail to be installed along the east side of the proposed roadway between Big Bear Creek and Rapp Road. Road construction is expected to begin by Spring 2010.

Greg Dickens has served as Director of Keller Public Works since August 2006. He is responsible for operation and maintenance of the public water, sanitary sewer, street and drainage systems, along with other duties.

Greg grew up in Weatherford, earned his engineering degree from Texas Tech and did post-



graduate study UT-Arlington. Previously, Greg worked as City Engineer and Public Works Director Bedford for four years, as **Public** Works Director in North Richland Hills for 14

years and for private engineering firms where he worked on water, sewer, street and drainage projects.


## **2010 U.S. Census**

- The U.S. Constitution requires a Census to be conducted every 10 years.
- The Census counts every resident in the United States.

- Data determines the number of representatives a state has in the U.S. House of Representatives.
- Personal information is by law kept private and not shared.

The form must be filled out to account for everyone living in a household as of April 1, 2010.

2010 Census forms will be mailed in

March 2010 to all households in the U.S. and Puerto Rico.

Forms should be completed

and returned by April 1, 2010.

- Census takers will visit households starting in April that did not return the form by mail.
- Census takers are required to carry identification that you may ask to see.

## **Did You Know? Solicitors Permits**

The City of Keller solicitors ordinance may not work when the Department of

requires solicitors to carry a solicitor permit that is clearly presented and not disturb homeowners who have "No Soliciting" signs posted. Solicitors must undergo background checks before the Police Department will issue permits to them.

According to the ordinance, solicitors may not disturb a private residence in the City before 9 a.m. or after 5 p.m. Monday-

Saturday, or at any time Sunday or any federally designated holiday. Solicitors



Homeland Security has declared an Orange or Red State of Alert. These rules do not apply to those who have been requested or invited to a home by the occupant.

You have a right to see a solicitor's permit. Please call Keller Police at 817-743-4522 if a solicitor refuses to show a permit to you or ignores your posted sign. If a solicitor acts

in a threatening manner, call 9-1-1 immediately.

#### **Exemptions**

Religious groups going door-to-door to hand out material about their church or religion are exempt from the permit requirement, as are school-age students selling items for school fundraisers or other nonprofit youth groups. A candidate running for public office does not need a permit.

These requirements for solicitors do not apply to the distribution of items such as door hangers or hand bills. Such items may be left even when a "No Soliciting" sign is present.
