

Key Parks & Open Space Milestones

- 1973 First land dedicated for public park, Bear Creek park, operated by Tarrant County (44 acres)
- 1989 Opening of Johnson Road Park (15 acres) in conjunction with the Keller Senior Center (4,350 sq ft) and Keller Public Library
 - Parks and Recreation Board established
- 1991 City of Keller became one of first cities in Texas to pass an election for a 4B sales tax dedicated to parks and recreation capital improvements and establishes a 4B board, Keller Development Corporation
- 1992 Parks and Recreation Department established
- Opening of city's first hike and bike trail, Big Bear Creek Greenbelt, Keller Smithfield Activity Node(22 acres) and Bear Creek Park renovations from Bear Creek Park to Keller Smithfield Road
- Opening of city's first public sports fields, Keller Sports Park (originally 101 acres expanding to 174 acres)
- Opening of city's first public recreation center and pool, The Keller Pointe, (84,000+ square feet) which resulted in the department becoming the largest city department

Parks Department Facts

- Department was created in 1992
- Mission Statement Enriching our community through people, parks and programs!
- Parks & Facilities
 - 11 developed parks totaling 335.57 acres
 - 18.66 miles of hike and bike trail
 - The Keller Pointe, 87,940 square-foot state of the art, operationally self sustaining recreation and aquatic center with over 10,000 individual members
 - Keller Senior Activities Center, 4,350 square feet
- Programs and Events
 - 28 special events annually with approximately 40, 000 participants
 - 2,800 programs with over 39,000 in attendance
 - 20 leagues with over 900 participants
 - 600 volunteers providing approximately 2,500 volunteer hours
 - 900 facility and pavilion reservations






Executive Summary

Parks provide intrinsic environmental, aesthetic, and recreation benefits to our cities. They are also a source of positive economic benefits. They enhance property values, increase municipal revenue, bring in homebuyers and workers, and attract retirees.

At the bottom line, parks are a good financial investment for a community. Understanding the economic impacts of parks can help decision makers better evaluate the creation and maintenance of urban parks.

Benefits of Parks, Open Space & Trails



New York's Central Park: Cost = \$13 million From 1856 – 1873: Property values increased by \$209 million.

- Over 30 studies have shown that proximity to parks has a positive effect on property values (starting at 20% increase on properties immediately adjacent to parks)
- This increase in property values is sufficient for the public sector to pay for the required park improvements


